Youth Project

Supporting young people aged 8 to 17 years who are impacted by the imprisonment of a family member

Did you know...

- Around 312,000 children are impacted by parental imprisonment each year in England and Wales
- Research shows that children and young people would like to talk about their feelings around the imprisonment of a family member but are rarely asked
- More children experience parental imprisonment than divorce
- These children are more than twice as likely to suffer from mental health problems than their peers

What is available for children and young people through Nepacs youth project?

Youth zones

We provide special youth room facilities for young people aged 8 to 17 years visiting HMPs Holme House, Frankland, Northumberland and HMP&YOI Low Newton. These facilities are staffed on weekends and during school holidays and aim to provide:

- A safe and welcoming place for young people to interact with their peers whilst waiting to visit a loved one.
- A chance for young people to speak to one of our youth workers or volunteers to develop self-confidence and self-esteem.
- An opportunity to 'normalise' the prison visit as much as possible by engaging in social activities, such as games and arts and crafts.

Youth trips

We are funded by BBC Children in Need to provide monthly trips and activities for young people impacted by imprisonment across the north east. These activities include go karting, DJ workshops and visits to trampoline parks. The main purpose of our trips is to:

- Emphasise fun and enjoyment
- Create peer support networks
- Increase self-esteem and confidence by challenging young people to step out of their comfort zone.

Residentials

When? During the Easter and summer holidays.

What happens?

The youth project residential involves three days and two nights away from home at an outdoor activity centre in Northumberland.

Young people will take part in adventurous activities including zip wire, 3G swing and high ropes climbing, working together as a team to develop resilience and forge new friendships.

Is there any cost? No. All of our trips and residential activities are completely free although a returnable deposit may be required to secure a place for the residentials.

One to one support

For those young people who require more targeted support in coming to terms with the imprisonment of a family member, we offer a limited one to one service consisting of three one-hour sessions for children living in the north east. Sessions take place at school or a family support centre. For further information about making a referral, please contact the youth project team using the contact details overleaf.

Family days

Family days take place during school holidays across all of the north east prisons and youth project staff support these by providing ageappropriate activities and games for children aged eight and above. Family days are a special opportunity for young people to spend quality time with their loved ones over the course of a whole day. The Nepacs youth project works closely with young people and families impacted by imprisonment to provide a positive and supportive experience during times of uncertainty and anxiety.

Through the dedication of staff and volunteers we strive to reduce isolation, improve self-esteem and provide young people with a voice and sense of increased citizenship.
